

Administrator's update

Reflecting upon my second year as Administrator, the most significant achievement is the Australian Government's commitment to restoring local democracy and the decision that a bespoke governance model for Norfolk Island is the best way to do this. Developing a bespoke governance model is a very difficult task that the members of the Norfolk Island Governance Committee have been working on diligently. Community representatives Chris Magri and Chelsea Evans have forthrightly presented and advocated the community's views and borne criticism when some of these are not accommodated. We have in these representatives exceptional and passionate individuals who are working for what is achievable for our community.

Following the recent federal election, we saw Minister Kristy McBain reappointed as Minister for Regional Development, Local Government and Territories, while also taking on additional responsibility as federal Minister for Emergency Management. I look forward to continuing to work closely with Minister McBain over the coming months, particularly around Norfolk Island's new governance model and our resilience in extreme weather.

The NIGC is now reinvigorating its meeting schedule to progress detailed planning for the next key elements of the model. This includes a videconference discussion with the Minister on implementation of the model followed by an on-island workshop for NIGC members. We will update the community on the outcomes of this work in coming weeks.

Bounty Day 2025 Celebrations

Bounty Day is a very special day for Norfolk Island. This year, we commemorated it on Monday 9 June, with a re-enactment of the arrival of the ancestors from Pitcairn Island. Locals were dressed in their traditional outfits, participating in the march through Kingston, up Quality Row, past Government House to the cemetery where we paid respects to those laid to rest.

Many visitors watched from close by, enjoying the procession and photo opportunities. The community picnic in the compound was wonderful, as always. My family and I joined David Buffett and his family this year and 'dem wetls dar swiit'.

The tradition of morning tea with home cooked biscuits at Government House saw a couple of hundred people enjoying the sunshine and the traditional rolling down the hill was enjoyed by our young sullen with screams of excitement. Plenty of washing followed from the very welcome wet, (but muddy!) ground.

UPDATE ON EMPLOYMENT SUPPORT ARRANGEMENTS

Implementation of the Norfolk Island Employment Support Program has reached the next stage, progressing towards delivery of the new model and enhanced services from July 1.

Following the recent procurement process, there is a preferred Norfolk Island-based provider, with ongoing work to finalise contractual arrangements for them to deliver the streamlined employment and assistance program from the commencement of the new financial year. The Australian Government announced the new centralised program last year, as part of its commitment to providing community-led services that meet the distinct needs of Norfolk Island.

By streamlining the services and supports currently provided through the Employment Services (Norfolk Island), Disability Employment Services (DES), and VET Assistance Financial Assistant Initiative into a one-provider program, participants will have greater access to specialised support and resources tailored to our remote region.

We will keep the community updated on transition arrangements once the provider is brought on board and the contract signed, as we continue apace for a 1 July launch.
