Together, we have reinvigorated the Indian Ocean Territories Health Service Community Advisory Committee, strengthened our Emergency Management Committees, advanced economic planning through the Christmas Island Economic Futures Working Group and supported meaningful community engagement on key issues.



While I am deeply grateful for the trust placed in me, the work of Administrator does not pause — and my focus remains firmly on serving our communities. This role is a privilege, and I am passionate about getting on

with the job and continuing the work we have started together.

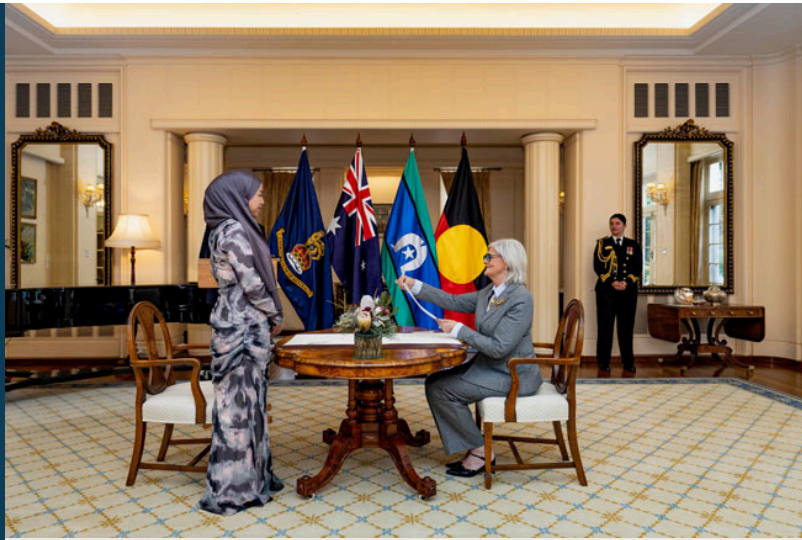
Looking ahead, activity across the region continues at pace. There is a great deal under way, from infrastructure projects to community consultations, sporting programs and cultural initiatives.

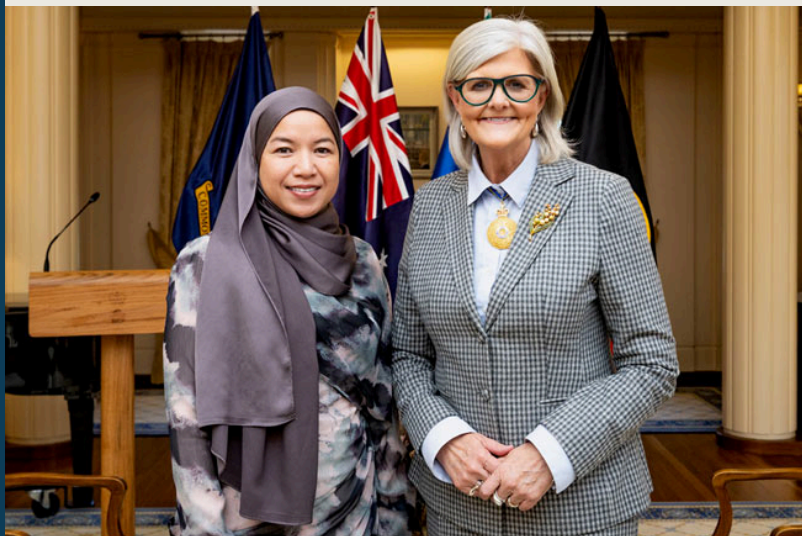

Funding Opportunity Opens to Support Disaster Resilience in the IOT

The Australian Government has opened Round Four of the Disaster Ready Fund (DRF), with up to \$142.5 million available nationwide in 2026–27 to support projects that reduce disaster risk and strengthen community resilience.

In announcing the latest round, Minister for Emergency Management and Regional Development, Local Government and Territories Kristy McBain, has highlighted the importance of proactive, community-focused emergency management — particularly in remote areas, like the Indian Ocean Territories (IOT).

Communities on Christmas Island and the Cocos (Keeling) Islands face unique challenges due to their isolation, reliance on critical infrastructure, and exposure to hazards such as cyclones, heavy rainfall and coastal impacts. Programs like the DRF support practical, locally relevant solutions to these risks.

While the DRF is a competitive, merit-based program and funding is not guaranteed, Round Four offers an opportunity to develop projects that improve long-term preparedness and resilience in the IOT.

The DRF is the Australian Government's flagship investment in disaster risk reduction, providing up to \$1 billion over five years from 1 July 2023. It supports initiatives that reduce the impacts of natural hazards and strengthen communities before disasters occur.

Applications for Round Four are open from 29 May to 1 July 2026 (5:00 pm WST) and must be submitted through state and territory Lead Agencies. The program is administered by the National Emergency Management Agency (NEMA) in partnership with jurisdictions.

Community members and organisations interested in applying are encouraged to review the Guidelines,

contact their Lead Agency, and start developing project ideas that reflect local risks and priorities.

The Australian Government remains committed to working with IOT communities to build a safer and more resilient future.

Izzy brought her passion for the world's game to eager locals of all ages — from young players taking their first steps onto the pitch to seasoned community members keen to sharpen their skills. Her sessions were lively, inclusive and full of enthusiasm, reflecting the strong appetite for sport across the IOT.

This visit and the upcoming sporting programs have been made possible through the support of the Australian Government, with thanks to the Western Australian Government and the local Shires and sporting clubs for working together to ensure that our future sporting superstars across the Indian Ocean Territories get to experience mentorship from sporting greats first-hand.

A full wrap-up of the Football West visit will be shared soon, but the good news is that the action isn't stopping there.

In June, the islands will welcome Volleyball Western Australia, represented by Community and Stakeholder Engagement Coordinator Leah Clayton. Originally from Texas in the United States, Leah brings a wealth of experience from her previous role in Business Development Operations at the London Youth Games,

along with a deep personal passion for volleyball and rock climbing.

Leah's work with Volleyball WA focuses on expanding opportunities for people across the state to get involved in the sport, from established indoor, beach and indoor-beach volleyball codes to the emerging fourth code, Park Volleyball. This new format embraces the dynamic, social side of the sport, played in parks, on beaches and even in public pools.

Leah is excited to visit the Indian Ocean Territories in June to work with local communities, run skills sessions and help build on the momentum created by recent sporting programs. Her visit marks another step in strengthening participation, confidence and connection through sport across both islands.

More details will be shared on IOT News soon, and we look forward to seeing the community get involved once again.

ANZAC Day 2026: Our communities remember

On 25 April, communities across the Indian Ocean Territories gathered in the early hours of the morning to honour the duty and sacrifice of Australian and New Zealand service men and women. ANZAC Day remains one of the most significant moments in our shared calendar, and this year's commemorations on both Christmas Island and the Cocos (Keeling) Islands were marked with sincerity, reflection, and a strong sense of togetherness.

On Christmas Island, residents once again turned out in strong numbers for the dawn service at Tai Jin House. The Shire provided community bus transport for seniors and families, while many others made the traditional walk up the hill for the dawn ceremony overlooking the island's historic coastline. The 2026 service marked the 111th anniversary of the Gallipoli campaign and opened with a welcome from CIDHS students Shiau Wei Chu and Xing Yan Ng, who also acknowledged the ex-servicemen and women in attendance. Fellow student Abby Kwong delivered a moving reading of the Requiem.

CIDHS student Elliot Ong reflected on Christmas Island's own wartime history, honouring the five British soldiers who lost their lives at the Smith Point Gun Barracks as the Japanese invasion force approached Flying Fish Cove in 1942. Warrant Officer Ben Scott delivered the ANZAC address, drawing on his service across international and domestic relief missions and deployments in the Middle East, including Afghanistan. Julie McKnight then offered a New Zealand perspective before island organisations laid wreaths and poppies.

Music added to the ceremony's atmosphere, with CIDHS Music Teacher Timothy Holland on piano and CIDHS Principal Sarah Faulkner on violin accompanying the Ode of Remembrance, read by Lieutenant Elisa Graves of the Royal Australian Navy. As the sun rose over Smith Point, classical guitar by Simon Bolland drifted across the grounds, leading into a community breakfast at Tai Jin House — one of the most atmospheric settings imaginable for concluding an ANZAC Day service.

Across the water, the Cocos (Keeling) Islands community also gathered for their own dawn service — a small, sincere commemoration held at the edge of the Indian Ocean. Residents came together in quiet reflection, honouring the courage, loss, and enduring legacy of those who served. The simplicity of the setting and the strong sense of community made the ceremony deeply meaningful.

Across both territories, ANZAC Day was marked with dignity, gratitude, and a shared commitment to remembrance. Thank you to all organisers, volunteers, students, service personnel, and community members who contributed to these thoughtful and memorable commemorations.

IOTA enterprise agreement

The Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development, Communications, Sport and the Arts (the department) advises the community that bargaining on the proposed Indian Ocean Territories Administration enterprise agreement has concluded.

A ballot was conducted by IR Balloting, an independent provider engaged to ensure a transparent and secure voting process. Voting was open to eligible employees from 13 to 15 May.

We are pleased to confirm that a **majority of eligible employees** voted **in favour of the proposed agreement**.

The proposed agreement includes pay increases and new and improved leave and allowance provisions, as well as a modernised enterprise agreement, classification and pay structure which will provide significant benefits to employees and their families living and working on Christmas Island and the Cocos (Keeling) Islands.

The department will now progress the next steps required under the Fair Work Act, including lodging the agreement with the Fair Work Commission for formal approval. The agreement will commence seven days after it is approved by the Commission.

The department acknowledges the commitment of bargaining representatives throughout the bargaining negotiations. We thank staff for their participation in the process and for the vital services they continue to deliver across the Indian Ocean Territories.

Progress on the Old Tech School Office and Amenities Upgrade



Work is continuing on the Old Tech School site, with significant progress made on the new childcare office and upgraded amenities building — an important project that will support families, staff and the broader Christmas Island community.

This upgrade reflects the Government’s ongoing commitment to improving local facilities and creating safe, inclusive spaces for everyone. Once complete, the new building will feature a new childcare office, a universal access toilet and shower, male, female and child-friendly toilets, a separate unisex staff toilet, and a dedicated cleaner’s storeroom.

The project was prioritised due to significant termite damage in the existing childcare office and amenities block. It will deliver a functionally superior and more resilient facility designed to meet current standards and better serve the community into the future.

Local builder Acker is leading the construction, with JLL managing the project on behalf of the department. From the outset, there has been a strong focus on balancing progress with minimising disruption to the childcare centre and other occupants and users of the Technical School.

Initial site works commenced in late 2025 with safety fencing and temporary toilets installed prior to demolition of the old facility. Construction of the new facility got underway in January with Acker and JLL closely coordinating with the childcare centre and other tenants to schedule major disruptive works on weekends and, wherever possible, to minimise noisy works during normal operating hours. This included no work being undertaken during the scheduled nap time for children at the daycare.

Despite some construction delays due to weather and challenging underground services, the new building has reached “lock-up” stage, which means the building’s external shell is fully enclosed, weatherproof

and physically secure. The roof is on, wall cladding installed, and first-fit services (electrical, fire, plumbing, ventilation, and air conditioning) are well in progress. Internal and external works will continue through June and July with the installation of doors and windows, internal fit out, wall and floor tiling, plumbing fixtures, vanities, lighting, painting and other finishing tasks.

The department understands that projects like this can cause temporary inconvenience, and appreciates the patience and cooperation shown by the community so far. Regular updates, engagement meetings and milestone reporting will continue throughout the build to keep everyone informed and involved.

It's great news that the project remains on schedule for completion by the end of July.

Once finished, the upgraded facility will provide a safer, more accessible and welcoming space for site users.

Thank you to the community for your ongoing support as we work together toward this important outcome.



Pulu Cocos Museum shines with new gallery lighting

The Pulu Cocos Museum is glowing. Thanks to the generous support from the Maritime Museums of Australia Project Support Scheme (MMAPSS) and the Shire of Cocos (Keeling) Islands, the Museum has upgraded its gallery lighting to a conservation standard system that brings the space closer to industry best practice.

This might sound like a small change, but for our community it's a big step forward. Improved lighting means greater stability and protection for the precious cultural objects entrusted to the Museum's care. That includes two of our most significant treasures – Ready and GCR, both proudly listed on the Australian Register

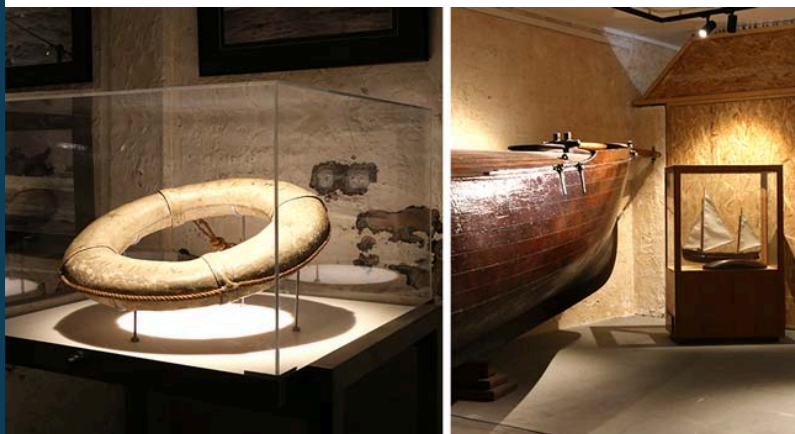
of Historic Vessels. With the new lighting in place, these vessels and the wider collection can be displayed in a safer, more controlled environment that honours their history and ensures they can be enjoyed for generations.



A special shout-out goes to Niamh at the Shire of CKI, whose ongoing work with WA Museum's Tim Eastwood continues to drive thoughtful, practical improvements to the Home Island museum. Her commitment to strengthening local heritage spaces is deeply appreciated across the community.

This project reflects what makes the Cocos Islands so special: collaboration, care for shared heritage, and a community that looks after its stories.

Big thanks also goes to the Australian National Maritime Museum, the Australian Government, and the Western Australian Museum, for helping to make this upgrade a reality. Their support ensures local history continues to shine on Cocos.



Cocos (Keeling) Islands Airfield Upgrade

PROJECT UPDATE: MAY 2026

Welcome to the May 2026 Cocos (Keeling) Islands Airfield Upgrade Project Update.

Material Offloading Facility

- Construction of the new Material Offloading Facility (MOF) is almost complete and it is expected to be commissioned by June-2026.
- We remind all community members and visitors that the access to the MOF is strictly prohibited. It has been constructed to support the Airfield Upgrade construction works and will continue to be a restricted access area for project personnel only. This arrangement will continue until the airfield upgrade works are complete and the project has demobilised from West Island.



Accommodation Camp

- We'd like to thank everyone for their patience while the accommodation building modules were transported from Rumah Baru to the Quarantine Station. The transportation of accommodation camp buildings from the Quarantine Station to the worker camp site is now complete. Works will now be focused on fitting out and furnishing the buildings. The Project does not anticipate any further disruptions during the establishment works.



Seawater Reverse Osmosis Plant

- The project team is working with the Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development, Communications, Sport and the Arts on the design for a temporary Seawater Reverse Osmosis plant to be operated while the project is under construction and the permanent plant Seawater Reverse Osmosis is still being built.
- The design for the temporary Seawater Reverse Osmosis plant is forecast to be completed in the coming months, and construction of enabling works is expected to commence from mid-2026.

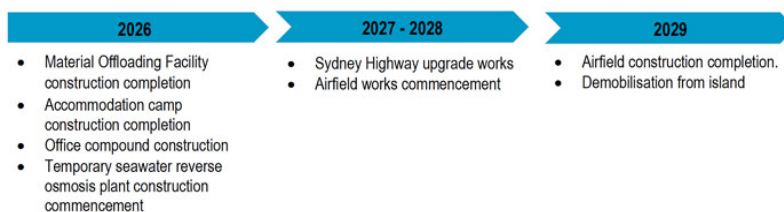
Airfield Works

- Works are scheduled to commence in early-2027.
