Short comment

There is still discrimination in public transport, particularly for people with disability living in regional Australia. For example:

lack of disabled toilets on public transport, particularly long distance (i.e., between regional cities or a regional town and major centre).
difficulty of access to buses, coaches and trains. Some stops have no access and often bus stops have uneven ground or high kerbs that make access very difficult.

- when transport infrastructure breaks down the auxiliary transport is often not accessible (i.e., the Australind train breaks down and the replacement bus is not accessible).

- there is still discrimination from taxi and rideshare operators - they occasionally refuse to pick up a wheelchair passenger that is able to use a normal vehicle, insisting that only one of the limited number of modified vans can be used by this passenger.

- car parks: these are often not available for people with mobility aids. While disabled parking bays are wider than other bays, they are often taken by people that do not need a mobility aid. A person with a mobility aid cannot park in a normal width bay. In addition public boat ramps, trailer parking and caravan parking do not have disabled bays. This is highly discriminatory.
