Maybe some sort of safety catch to make sure the wheelchair stays up when going around corners would make me feel much safer. Mine has never tipped but I always worry. With trains it would just be nice if train floors and platforms were at the same height. Also having less gap between the train and the platform if possible would be a great safety assist. Possibly a pop-out from the train.

What do you dislike about the public transport you use?

Not all the trains are set up for wheelchairs. The sunshine coast ones with the glass panels are useless for wheelchairs.

What is the greatest barrier for you to use public transport?

Ramps and lack of space. There is only room for four on the bus. Wheelchairs, Walkers, and Prams and sometimes there are more.

Passenger loading areas, Allocated spaces in transit

Bus stops could be raised to the same as bus floor height. Train platforms could have a raised area at the handicapped access area. Consider adding in some dual purpose seating areas to allow for extra busy times.

2. Mobility aid safety

They are always sympathetic, and even apologetic but its not their fault that some people are ignorant.

15. Passenger loading areas
