Hi Phil

Thanks for organising the meeting this morning with WaterNSW. It was a good opportunity to touch base with them and to hear Alex's update on the status of the project planning.

To progress things, I have attached a draft of the bilateral schedule for the capital projects and a separate one for s22 usiness Case. Could you please arrange to complete the milestones, due dates and associated payments in Table 1. I have included a couple of milestones in the capital schedule, based on publicly available information. However, please feel free to edit these as necessary. You will also need to provide the NSW Government funding profile in Table 2 - Balance of non-NWIDF contributions. I expect there will be a couple of iterations of these schedules before we land the finals, but keen to get something started now. While we will require all supporting documentation before we can sign off on the bilateral schedules (project plans with detail on scope, project schedule, budget, stakeholders, governance arrangements, communication plans, high level design plans and risk management plans), at this point all we need is the high level planning documentation on which you have based the milestones. As the projects progress we understand that some milestones may shift. We can vary the bilateral schedules as necessary throughout the life of the projects to reflect revised scheduling.

With regard to the National Partnership Agreement (Feasibility Component), the Deputy Prime Minister wrote to Minister Pavey on 2 April 2019 seeking her signature to the NPA (attached). However, we have no record of having received a signed copy. Could you please check at your end to see if it was signed and provide a copy to me. If it hasn't been signed, we will ensure that the DPM includes a copy for signature at the time he provides the bilateral schedules for signature.

I have attached a copy of the draft template we will use for the monthly teleconferences when we get to that point. These teleconferences provide an informal opportunity to understand how the projects are progressing, any media opportunities that may be upcoming and to identify any project risks or sensitivities. We do not have a template for the more formal six-monthly milestone reporting as we do not want to place additional reporting requirements on WaterNSW. However, we do expect that reports provided are able to demonstrate that Australian Government funding has been matched and milestones have been met in accordance with the bilateral schedule. With these reports we will also require a letter from the NSW Government (official to official) confirming that you have accepted the milestone report.

With regard to the loan funding, we would appreciate that you keep the NWGA involved in any conversations with the RIC and that you keep us updated on the NSW Government's deliberations on whether to take up the loan offer. We are working from this end to see whether we are able to implement any legislative changes that may assist with the decision making process. While I acknowledge that we won't have a decision on the loan funding in the immediate future, as soon as a decision is taken it will be important to finalise the contracting arrangements between RIC and the NSW Government and advise the NWGA, so that we are able to report on all Commonwealth funding towards the projects.

Hello all,

I'll be picking up these issues for NSW and would like to follow up to confirm a few items from our meeting on December 18.

Grant vs Loan administration and agreement

Given different entities administering and Ministers responsible, what is the proposed approach for agreeing the grant and loan component - is it envisaged there would be a single agreement, or are we required to enter into an agreement on the grant (as a schedule to the national partnership) and a separate agreement with the Regional Investment Corporation (RIC) covering the loan? If the latter are there separate contacts at RIC that NSW needs to be engaging with?

As discussed at the meeting there is an appetite from NSW Treasury to revisit the agreement on the loan given the cost of finance on offer vs what they can provide themselves. Should the State wish to make representations along those lines, who would be the appropriate Commonwealth Minister to contact to seek to;

a) change the weighting of Commonwealth contribution between grant and loan (e.g. change to a 60:40 funding split, with the C'wealth 40% provided by way of grant only), orb) alter the terms of the loan from those set out under the RIC operating licence?

I understand from the conversation that any change along the lines of (a) above would require C'wealth ERC's approval. For a change to the terms of the loan per (b) above, could that be determined at the discretion of the Responsible Ministers via s12(3) of the RIC act; or would that also need ERC approval?

Matching funding under the National Partnership (NP)

At the meeting it was confirmed that payments under the partnership would be based on delivery milestones, agnostic of which State Government entity incurred the costs. Is it right then to take that the requirements set out in the NP for the State to have committed at least matching funds, refers to the State incurring the expenditure to deliver those milestones? I ask as there is a scenario where a State Owned Corporation would deliver the works and incur the requisite expenditure, but how the SOC is 'funded' for those works by Treasury might be cashflowed differently.

I note that the bilateral schedules to the NP entered into by other States refer to lump sum amounts, rather than a % of total cost. Will this be the same approach for these projects? i.e. C'wealth makes capped financial contributions based on delivery of milestones (which are set at 25% of estimated costs at the outset); so long as the State expenditure is at least equal to the C'wealth contribution.





This Options Study identified infrastructure options that were considered successful in qualitatively addressing our perceived LOS gaps within a valley.



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


















































Project 11 – Wyangala Dam Raising

Water Security Solution

Valley: Lachlan

Description:

The Lachlan Valley lacks adequate capacity and capability to mitigate the impacts of drought and flood. As a result, reliability of water supply is low on average and highly variable.

The Millennium Drought from 2002 to 2010 caused profound hardship for many residents, with consecutive years of zero to little general security water allocation and water restrictions in dependent areas.

Since the break of the drought, floods have destroyed crops, damaged infrastructure, created safety risks, and resulted in significant financial and economic loss.

Raising Wyangala Dam contributes materially to achieving the desired 'step change' in water security, drought security and flood management capability.

Benefits:

- Modelling predicts an additional 21.05GL p.a. estimated yield for general security licence use
- The option of raising Wyangala Dam provides significant improvement in drought security, flood management and water reliability.
- Increased capability to manage high inflow / flood events.

Infrastructure Requirement:

- Raising of the embankment and associated downstream rockfill to add an additional 650GL of storage
- Raising the spillway and intake towers of the dam by 10m
- Associated works to ensure safe access and maintenance on the crest and downstream areas

Delivery Proposal:

Recommend proceeding to Final Business Case. Key items to address:


- Confirmation of water security benefits
- Stakeholder engagement, customer engagement and acceptance work
- Detailed environmental assessments
- Confirmation of financial and economic benefits
- Further refinement of concept design, spillway design and other engineering assessments

Future actions:


- Final business case estimated cost \$33.3M (ex-GST); and
- Approvals and capital works delivery \$620M (ex-GST \$2017)





Wyangala Dam

- Wyangala Dam, on the Lachlan River, is located about 50 kilometres south-east of Cowra in Central West NSW.
- The storage capacity of Wyangala Dam's is 1,217 gigalitres (GL), which is more than twice the volume of Sydney Harbour.
- On 28 September 2018 the dam storage level of Wyangala Dam was 54 per cent.
- The upgrade of Wyangala Dam, to increase storage capacity by 780 GL, is on the long list of options identified by the New South Wales Government in their 2017 "Lachlan Valley Water Security Project".
- The Lachlan Valley has been identified by the NSW Government as the first of four 'priority catchments' for the investment and delivery of critical water infrastructure projects in the next decade.
- The dam's purpose includes flood mitigation, hydro-power, irrigation, water supply and conservation. Wyangala
 Dam underpins the economic development of the Lachlan Valley as a major food producing region and supports
 irrigated agriculture around Cowra, Forbes, Condobolin and Hillston. It also supplies stock and household needs
 for landholders and towns along the Lachlan River.
- In 2010 the Wyangala Dam was one of seven dams, that were part of the NSW Government's \$350 million safety
 upgrades to ensure dams could withstand extreme weather conditions. The \$43 million Wyangala Dam upgrade
 included:
 - o Raising the chute wall on the downstream spillway to ensure it can withstand the most extreme floods;
 - o Raising the existing spillway radial gates 1.4m higher and installing a brake locking system to the gates; and,
 - o Raising the dam crest by 1.8m by provision of an upstream parapet wall.
