

What is an OPD	 The Senate may make an order for the Government to table specified information/documents at or by a particular time on a particular day. An order can be made as a 'one off' request for documents or may be a permanent order,
	 known as an 'order of continuing effect' (where there may be annual or biannual deadlines). These orders are known as Orders for the Production of Documents (OPDs) or 'an order for returns' and are a common means by which senators seek information.

Authority	Senate Standing Order 164
Request for an OPD	 A notice of motion will be lodged and moved by a senator, and determined during 'Discovery of Formal Business' on any sitting day, ie after Question Time on Mondays to Wednesdays or before Question Time on Thursdays. If agreed, the Clerk will write to the Leader of the Government in the Senate and the relevant Minister in the Senate to inform them of the Order. The Senate PLO will also give the Minister's office a heads up (by email) as soon as the motion is agreed in the Chamber to ensure as much notice as possible is given.
Responding to an OPD	 Decisions about the release of documents are up to the relevant Minister/s. I refer to the Senate Order for the Production of Documents agreed by the Senate on Thursday 12 November 2020 (the Order), requiring the tabling of the ten written briefings on the acquisition of the Leppington Triangle land between the period November 2015 to November 2019 (including any annotations of decision makers), which are referenced in paragraph 4.1 on page 57 of Auditor-General Report No 9 2020-21 Purchase of the 'Leppington Triangle' Land for the Future Development of Western Sydney Airport (the Report).

The documents specified in the Order will not be produced as I am advised that it would not be in the public interest to comply with the Order for the reasons set out below.

The Senate has recognised that where the provision of information would have the tendency to prejudice law enforcement investigations, public interest immunity (PII) may be invoked. This is reflected in Odgers' Australian Senate Practice, 14th edition, which states in chapter 19 that this ground may be invoked if it is 'established that there are investigations in progress by a law enforcement agency, such as the police, and the provision of the information sought could interfere with those investigations.' This is also reflected in paragraph 4.6.1 of the Government Guidelines for Official Witnesses before Parliamentary Committees and Related Matters, which notes that a PII claim may be made in relation to information which would, or might reasonably be expected to 'prejudice the investigation of a possible breach of the law or the enforcement of the law in a particular instance'.

The Australian Federal Police (AFP) advised the Senate Legal and Constitutional Affairs Committee on 20 October 2020 that the matters which were the subject of the Report are under active investigation by the AFP. The investigation is in its early stages. Information provided to the Senate in response to an Order under Senate Standing Order 164 is tabled and published. The public disclosure of information concerning the matters under investigation by the AFP, including to the Senate, would have the potential to prejudice that investigation.

Public disclosure of such information could influence or inhibit the evidence of potential witnesses in the AFP investigation and disclose possible avenues of enquiry. Further, the disclosure of information concerning the matters under active investigation in the course of the proceedings of Parliament (which includes proceedings before the Committee) may create obstacles to the use of that information in any court or tribunal proceedings which might follow the investigation.

In this regard, the courts have recognised that public disclosure of matters which are the subject of an active investigation 'might inhibit the willingness of persons to volunteer information relevant to the investigation' and that the ability of investigating authorities to obtain 'the fullest possible information, without the persons volunteering such information being inhibited by any possible repercussions which might flow from the disclosure of the information' is to be protected.

I am also advised that it would also not be in the public interest to provide the documents specified in the Order because the documents are integral to an ongoing disciplinary investigation under the *Public Service Act 1999*. Disclosure of the documents may enable the identity of those subject to this investigation to be identified.

I trust this information is of assistance.

I refer to the Senate Order for the Production of Documents agreed by the Senate on Thursday 12 November 2020 (the Order), requiring the tabling of the ten written briefings on the acquisition of the Leppington Triangle land between the period November 2015 to November 2019 (including any annotations of decision makers), which are referenced in paragraph 4.1 on page 57 of Auditor-General Report No 9 2020-21 Purchase of the 'Leppington Triangle' Land for the Future Development of Western Sydney Airport (the Report).

The documents specified in the Order will not be produced as I am advised that it would not be in the public interest to comply with the Order for the reasons set out below.

The Senate has recognised that where the provision of information would have the tendency to prejudice law enforcement investigations, public interest immunity (PII) may be invoked. This is reflected in Odgers' Australian Senate Practice, 14th edition, which states in chapter 19 that this ground may be invoked if it is 'established that there are investigations in progress by a law enforcement agency, such as the police, and the provision of the information sought could interfere with those investigations.' This is also reflected in paragraph 4.6.1 of the Government Guidelines for Official Witnesses before Parliamentary Committees and Related Matters, which notes that a PII claim may be made in relation to information which would, or might reasonably be expected to 'prejudice the investigation of a possible breach of the law or the enforcement of the law in a particular instance'.

The Australian Federal Police (AFP) advised the Senate Legal and Constitutional Affairs Committee on 20 October 2020 that the matters which were the subject of the Report are under active investigation by the AFP. The investigation is in its early stages. Information provided to the Senate in response to an Order under Senate Standing Order 164 is tabled and published. The public disclosure of information concerning the matters under investigation by the AFP, including to the Senate, would have the potential to prejudice that investigation.

Public disclosure of such information could influence or inhibit the evidence of potential witnesses in the AFP investigation and disclose possible avenues of enquiry. Further, the disclosure of information concerning the matters under active investigation in the course of the proceedings of Parliament (which includes proceedings before the Committee) may create obstacles to the use of that information in any court or tribunal proceedings which might follow the investigation.

In this regard, the courts have recognised that public disclosure of matters which are the subject of an active investigation 'might inhibit the willingness of persons to volunteer information relevant to the investigation' and that the ability of investigating authorities to obtain 'the fullest possible information, without the persons volunteering such information being inhibited by any possible repercussions which might flow from the disclosure of the information' is to be protected¹.

I am also advised that it would also not be in the public interest to provide the documents specified in the Order because the documents are integral to an ongoing disciplinary investigation under the *Public Service Act 1999*. Disclosure of the documents may enable the identity of those subject to this investigation to be identified.
